Archaeological site reports, either annual or multi-year, are also welcome. Submissions may be in English, French, German or Italian, but the final publication will be in English. All articles are peer-reviewed.

INSTRUCTION FOR AUTHORS

The journal invites submissions of original research in all disciplines relating to Etruscan and Italic studies, such as archaeology, archaeometry, art history, epigraphy, and history. Archaeological site reports, either annual or multi-year, are also welcome. Submissions may be in English, French, German, or Italian, but the final publication will be in English.

All articles are reviewed by two scholars in addition to the Editor and Associate Editor. While the members of the *Etruscan Studies* Editorial Board often serve as reviewers, manuscripts are also screened by other international experts. While book reviews are not peer-reviewed, they will be read by all editors prior to publication.

In accordance with the principles established by the Archaeological Institute of America as outlined in the *American Journal of Archaeology* 94 (1990) 525-527, *Etruscan Studies* will not be the vehicle for the initial scholarly presentation of objects in private or public collections acquired after December 30, 1973, unless the object can be documented as part of a previously existing collection or has been legally exported from the country of origin.
